Not even the most optimistic PFC CSKA Moskva supporter would admit the portents are overly positive for their visit to Old Trafford on Matchday 4 – after all the Russian team's most recent group-stage away win came in the same 2004/05 season that United last suffered a home defeat in the UEFA Champions League.

- That record, and a 1-0 home reverse against United on Matchday 3 thanks to Antonio Valencia's late goal, means new CSKA coach Leonid Slutski and his players may feel they have something to prove as they look to better their first Group B away performance, a 3-1 reverse at VfL Wolfsburg.

### **Match background**

- CSKA parted company with coach Juande Ramos by mutual consent on Monday 26 October, the day after a 3-1 Premier-Liga loss against FC Moskva. Ramos had been appointed on 10 September to replace Zico but could not put his side into contention for the Russian title, picking up ten points from six league games.
- PFC Krylya Sovetov Samara coach Slutski was immediately named as Ramos's successor. The 38-year-old former goalkeeper previously coached FC Olimpia Volgograd, FC Uralan Elista and Moskva, joining Krylya Sovetov before the 2008 season and leading them to a sixth-placed finish in his only full campaign.
- Slutski made his UEFA club competition debut this season with Krylya. The expedition was short-lived, though, as Slutski's side were eliminated by the Republic of Ireland's Saint Patrick's Athletic FC in the UEFA Europa League third qualifying round. They lost 1-0 in Dublin and went out on away goals despite winning the return leg 3-2.
- United, whose victory in Moscow was their first against Russian opposition at the sixth attempt, are unbeaten in 22 UEFA Champions League home games dating back to February 2005 but failed to win on the two previous occasions they welcomed Russian visitors to Old Trafford.
- A goalless draw with FC Torpedo Moskva was the precursor to a penalty shoot-out defeat after a second stalemate with the same opponents in Moscow in the 1992/93 UEFA Cup first round.
- There was further disappointment for United when SC Rotor Volgograd came to Old Trafford in the 1995/96 UEFA Cup first round. Although Paul Scholes and goalkeeper Peter Schmeichel scored to undo a two-goal half-time deficit, the 2-2 draw sent United out on the away-goals rule.
- United suffered at the hands of another Russian club, FC Zenit St. Petersburg, when going down 2-1 in last season's UEFA Super Cup in Monaco.
- This is CSKA's first appearance at Old Trafford but they will arrive with positive memories of their most recent trip to England when they drew 1-1 at Aston Villa FC in the round of 32 of last season's UEFA Cup. The now departed Vágner Love scored their goal and they went on to eliminate Villa 3-1 on aggregate.
- CSKA are still seeking a first victory on English soil and have won just once in 13 away outings in the UEFA Champions League group stage – 3-1 at Paris Saint-Germain FC in December 2004.
- The 2004/05 UEFA Cup winners succumbed 3-1 to United's great rivals Liverpool FC in the 2005 UEFA Super Cup.

### **Team ties**

- United duo Michael Owen (2) and Rio Ferdinand were on target when England earned a 3-0 Wembley victory against a Russia side featuring CSKA's Aleksei Berezutski, Vasili Berezutski and Sergei Ignashevich in a UEFA EURO 2008™ qualifier in September 2007.
- That CSKA trio subsequently gained revenge as they helped Russia beat England 2-1 in the return fixture in Moscow the following month, despite United's Wayne Rooney hitting the opening goal.
- Nemanja Vidić spent the 2004 and 2005 seasons with CSKA's arch-rivals FC Spartak Moskva. He made 39 league appearances and scored four goals, including one at CSKA in September 2004 though it did not stop his side going down to a 2-1 league defeat.
- Vidić is an international team-mate of CSKA's Serbia midfielder Miloš Krsić.
- Anderson made his UEFA Champions League debut against CSKA for FC Porto in a goalless draw in Portugal in September 2006.
- Edwin van der Sar was in the AFC Ajax side defeated by Spartak in the 1997/98 UEFA Cup quarter-finals and the Netherlands team beaten by Russia in the UEFA EURO 2008™ quarter-finals. CSKA's Igor Akinfeev and Ignashevich played for the opposition in Basel.
- Ignashevich was also in the Russia team that denied Ryan Giggs's Wales in the qualifying play-offs for UEFA EURO 2004™.

### Manchester United

#### UEFA milestones

- The 2008/09 final defeat by FC Barcelona brought an end to United's 25-match unbeaten run – the longest in the competition's history. They had last tasted defeat at AC Milan on 2 May 2007. AFC Ajax and FC Bayern München shared the previous record of 19 matches unbeaten.
- United have scored 394 goals in the European Champion Clubs' Cup and conceded 196.

#### UEFA Champions League statistics

- United have been caught offside 22 times to date, more than any other side.
- The English champions have committed only 31 fouls, the lowest total in the competition.
- Nemanja Vidić's next booking will incur a suspension.

- Dimitar Berbatov's sixth goal in October for club and country put United in front at Old Trafford before Wayne Rooney's first goal since 20 September made the points safe.
- With Rio Ferdinand and Vidić out injured, Wes Brown and Jonny Evans came into central defence, the former making his first league appearance since August. Having made his United debut in midweek, former FC Girondins de Bordeaux winger Gabriel Obertan came on as a second-half substitute to take his Premier League bow.
- United's seven-match Premier League unbeaten record was ended by a 2-0 defeat at Liverpool FC on 25 October, their third successive loss against their Merseyside rivals. Second-half goals from Fernando Torres and David Ngog inflicted United's second league defeat of the season, the visitors ending with ten men as Vidić collected a second yellow card in the 89th minute.
- Sir Alex Ferguson's side have nevertheless recorded 12 wins, one defeat and one draw in their last 14 matches in all competitions.
- Of United's 23 league goals this season, 17 have come in the second half and eight in the last 15 minutes.
- After scoring against Tottenham Hotspur FC on 12 September, Ryan Giggs has registered in the top flight in each of his 20 campaigns with United and is the only player to find the net in all 18 seasons of the Premier League era.
- On 27 October, holders United won 2-0 at Barnsley FC to reach the last eight of the English League Cup thanks to goals early in each half from Daniel Welbeck and Michael Owen, although they had to play the final quarter of the match with ten men after Gary Neville's red card.
- United will host Tottenham in the League Cup quarter-finals in the week beginning 30 November, a repeat of last year's final which was won on penalties by United after a goalless 120 minutes.

- Rooney and former United player Cristiano Ronaldo have been shortlisted for the FIFA World Player of the Year award. The winner will be announced in Zurich on 21 December.

- On 15 October, Berbatov's partner Elena gave birth to the couple's first child, a girl named Dea.
- Patrice Evra and Republic of Ireland pair John O'Shea and Darron Gibson could be in opposition when France take on Giovanni Trapattoni's side in the FIFA World Cup play-offs on 14 and 18 November, while Bosnia-Herzegovina are the opponents for Nani and Portugal.

- The Russian side have conceded 96 goals in UEFA club competition.

- CSKA have won only six corners so far, the joint lowest total in the competition along with FC Unirea Urziceni.

##### **• Friday 30 October: PFC CSKA Moskva 1-0 FC Terek Grozny (Necid 3)**

- CSKA's victory over Terek was Leonid Slutski's first game in charge following his appointment as Juande Ramos's successor on 26 October. It was CSKA's first win in four matches in all competitions.
- Ramos only took over on 10 September and lost four of his nine fixtures at the helm, with his last match a 3-1 loss to FC Moskva on 25 October – CSKA's first home defeat in the Russian Premier-Liga since a 2-1 reverse against FC Spartak Moskva on 26 July.
- Slutski made three changes to the team the team beaten by FC Moskva, Aleksei Berezutski, Georgi Schennikov and Pavel Mamaev replacing Chidi Odiah, Anton Grigoriev and Evgeni Aldonin.
- Tomáš Necid's winner was the striker's second goal in as many games.
- The Moskva defeat was the first time this season that CSKA had conceded three league goals in a game.
- CSKA had lost four consecutive away fixtures prior to the 1-1 draw with PFC Spartak Nalchik on 17 October.
- The Army Men have not claimed three consecutive wins since April.
- CSKA have already won two trophies this year, lifting the Russian Super Cup in March and the Russian Cup two months later.

- Mark González – out 31 August to 26 September (thigh) and since 10 October (ankle)
- Guilherme – out since 17 October
- Sekou Oliseh – out since 30 October (hip)
- Oliseh had been set to start against Terek but sprained his hip in the pre-match warm-up and does not travel to Manchester.
- González has been ruled out for the rest of the year, having suffered an ankle injury while on international duty with Chile. Instead of returning to Moscow, the winger went directly to Munich for surgery.

#### **Miscellaneous**

- Igor Akinfeev, Vasili and Aleksei Berezutski, Sergei Ignashevich and Alan Dzagoev will all hope to be involved when Russia take on Slovenia in the FIFA World Cup play-offs on 14 and 18 November, while Elvir Rahimić's Bosnia-Herzegovina play Portugal.

## Head coach

---

### **Manchester United FC: Sir Alex Ferguson**

**Date of birth:** 31 December 1941

**Nationality:** Scottish

**Playing career:** Queen's Park FC, Saint Johnstone FC, Dunfermline Athletic FC, Rangers FC, Falkirk FC, Ayr United FC

**Coaching career:** Falkirk FC, East Stirlingshire FC, Saint Mirren FC, Aberdeen FC, Manchester United FC

- Shot to prominence at Aberdeen by breaking the Old Firm's 14-year stranglehold of the Scottish title in 1980.
- Claimed a first European title three years later when the Dons beat Real Madrid CF to lift the UEFA Cup Winners' Cup – earning him freedom of the City of Aberdeen.
- Replaced Ron Atkinson at Old Trafford in November 1986, and ended United's 26-year wait for an English title in 1993. Has since added ten more championships to a domestic collection which includes five FA Cups and three League Cups.
- Guided United to UEFA Cup Winners' Cup glory with victory against FC Barcelona in 1991, though his greatest achievements are the UEFA Champions League triumphs of 1999 and 2008.
- Knighted in June 1999, Sir Alex is head of the UEFA Coaches Panel.

- Started his playing career as a goalkeeper with Volgograd regional team FC Zvezda Gorodische, but suffered a severe injury after falling from a tree and was forced to hang up his gloves after just 13 matches.
- Began coaching career in youth football at Olimpia Volgograd. From 2002 to 2004 he worked at Uralan Elista where he was promoted to head coach following the club's top-flight relegation.
- Took the reins at Moskva reserves in 2004 and replaced Valeri Petrakov at the club's helm the following summer. Under Slutski, Moskva finished fifth in 2005, sixth in 2006 and then a record high fourth position in 2007.
- In December 2007, Slutski was appointed as Krylya coach and led them to a sixth-placed finish, gaining a European berth in the process.
- Resigned Krylya post on 9 October and on 26 October signed a three-year contract with CSKA Moskva, replacing Juande Ramos.

• Olegário Benquerença, an insurance broker based in Leiria, was born on 18 October 1969 and, having made fine progress after officiating his first top-flight match in October 1995, won his FIFA international badge in 2001 at the tender refereeing age of 31.

• He earned his international stripes working in each of UEFA's age-group competitions – U17s, U19s and U21s – before gaining further experience in the UEFA Cup and UEFA Champions League qualifying.

• Benquerença's first taste of UEFA Champions League group-stage action came in September 2005 as Udinese Calcio defeated Panathinaikos FC 3-0 and he was also in the middle for a FIFA World Cup qualifier involving Italy, the eventual winners, and Moldova in Lecce.

• Other highlights include the 2002 and 2008 Portuguese Cup finals, both won by Sporting Clube de Portugal and his first UEFA EURO 2008™ qualifier as Romania won 2-0 in Albania on 6 September.

• Benquerença, who lists music and cycling as his main hobbies, was fourth official at three matches in the final tournament in Austria and Switzerland and took charge of four UEFA Champions League games in 2008/09, including the first knockout round first leg between Chelsea FC and Juventus.

### • **UEFA Champions League:** Group stage milestones

Holders FC Barcelona are looking to avoid becoming the first defending champions to fail to get through a group stage since the UEFA Champions League began. (This record, like the others, includes the seasons between 1999/00 and 2002/03 that featured a second group stage).

In 1992/93, Barcelona were the reigning European Champion Clubs' Cup holders and were beaten 4-3 on aggregate in the second round by PFC CSKA Moskva.

S.S. Lazio goalkeeper Marco Ballotta became the oldest player to compete in the UEFA Champions League in 2007/08 when he featured against Olympiacos CFP on Matchday 1 at the age of 43 years and 168 days. The record was previously held by Alessandro Costacurta, the AC Milan defender who played against AEK Athens FC in the 2006/07 season at the age of 40 years and 211 days. Ballotta was aged 43 years 252 days when he featured against Real Madrid CF on Matchday 6.

Laurent Blanc is the oldest player to score in the competition, aged 36 years and 339 days, having found the net for Manchester United FC in their 3-2 defeat of Olympiacos CFP on 23 October 2002.

Celestine Babayaro is the youngest player to have appeared in the UEFA Champions League. He was 16 years and 87 days when he started for RSC Anderlecht against FC Steaua Bucureşti on 23 November 1994. He was then sent off in the 37th minute.

Barcelona, Manchester United and Milan have all finished as group winners on ten occasions, one more than Real Madrid and Juventus.

Four teams have recorded six successive victories in a UEFA Champions League group stage: Milan (1992/93), Paris Saint-Germain FC (1994/95), FC Spartak Moskva (1995/96) and Barcelona (2002/03, first group stage).

In 2006/07, PFC Levski Sofia joined 1. FC Košice in being the only team to have played in the UEFA Champions League and never picked up a point. The Slovakian side have not returned to the competition since losing all six games in their only campaign to date in 1997/98. Six other teams have gone through a single group stage campaign without picking up a point: FC Dynamo Kyiv (2007/08), SK Rapid Wien (2005/06) and RSC Anderlecht (2004/05) plus Spartak Moskva and Bayer 04 Leverkusen (2002/03, first and second group stage respectively) and Fenerbahçe SK (2001/02, first group stage).

Manchester United scored 20 goals in the 1998/99 group stage, more than any other side has managed. Barcelona scored 19 times in the 1999/2000 first group stage.

Dynamo conceded 19 goals in their six outings in 2007/08, equalling the record let in during a group stage set by Ferencvárosi TC in the 1995/96 campaign.

No team has ever gone through a UEFA Champions League group stage without conceding a goal. Milan (1992/93), AFC Ajax (1995/96), Juventus (1996/97 and 2004/05), Chelsea FC (2005/06), Liverpool FC (2005/06) and Villarreal CF (2005/06) all let in just one.

Before their 3-1 win against Sporting Clube de Portugal on Matchday 6 of the 2006/07 campaign, FC Spartak Moskva went 22 games without a victory in the competition, surpassing the unwanted record set by AEK Athens FC on Matchday 3 of the same campaign.

The lowest total for a team qualifying from the group stage is seven points. The first to do it, since three points for a win was introduced in 1995/96, were Legia Warszawa that same season before Bayer Leverkusen managed it in 1999/2000 and Liverpool in 2001/02. FC Lokomotiv Moskva and eventual finalists Juventus both progressed with seven points in 2002/03, a feat achieved by Rangers FC and Werder Bremen in 2005/06.
