Buoyed by their unexpected win at the Camp Nou on Matchday 3, FC Rubin Kazan welcome European champions FC Barcelona for their second home game in Group F having already held FC Internazionale Milano in Russia.

- Goals in each half from Aleksandr Ryazantsev and Gökdeniz Karadeniz stunned the UEFA Champions League holders in the first meeting between the teams – and Rubin's first game against Spanish opposition – and, while Barça remain top of the section, all four teams are now separated by a single point at the halfway stage ahead of the reverse fixture at the Centralniy Stadium.

#### Match background

- While this is Rubin's first home match against a Spanish club, Barcelona have travelled to Russia four times before and returned unbeaten on each occasion, recording one victory and three draws.

- The holders' last game in Russia was a UEFA Champions League first group-stage meeting with FC Lokomotiv Moskva on 1 October 2002.
- Xavi Hernández, Carles Puyol and Víctor Valdés featured for a Barcelona side who won 3-1 through goals from Patrick Kluivert and Javier Saviola (2).
- The current coach and director of football at the Camp Nou – Josep Guardiola and Txiki Begiristain respectively – were in the Barcelona side defeated by PFC CSKA Moskva in the UEFA Champions League second round in 1992/93. Although Begiristain scored in both legs, Barcelona's 3-2 home loss on 4 November 1992 ended their trophy defence, the 4-3 aggregate reverse denying them a place in the group stage.
- Rubin did not compete in Europe before 2004. Outside of qualifying rounds and UEFA Intertoto Cup ties, this is only their third home game in a UEFA club competition proper and they are still seeking a first win.
- Barcelona are unbeaten in seven away matches in the UEFA Champions League, including the goalless draw at Inter on Matchday 1.

#### **Team ties**

- Rubin captain Sergei Semak twice finished on the losing side against Barcelona's Spanish internationals Andrés Iniesta, Xavi Hernández and Carles Puyol at UEFA EURO 2008™. Semak's Russia side succumbed 4-1 to Spain in their opening group game and then 3-0 in the semi-final, where Xavi scored the first goal.
- Rubin's South African international Macbeth Sibaya suffered the same fate against Spain at this year's FIFA Confederations Cup. He lined up against Barcelona's Sergio Busquets, Gerard Piqué and Puyol as South Africa lost to the Spanish 2-0 in the group stage and 3-2 in the play-off for third place.
- Barcelona forward Thierry Henry had mixed fortunes against Russian clubs in the UEFA Champions League with former club Arsenal FC. He appeared against FC Spartak Moskva, Lokomotiv Moskva and CSKA, winning two, losing two and drawing two. He found the net once, in Arsenal's 1-0 home win against Spartak in the 2000/01 second group stage.
- Barcelona full-back Daniel Alves was in the Sevilla FC side that beat Lokomotiv home and away in the 2005/06 UEFA Cup round of 32. He also made three trips to FC Zenit St. Petersburg with Sevilla, but never finished on the winning side.
- César Navas began his career in Real Madrid CF's B team. He later played for Málaga CF, Catalonia's Club Gimnàstic de Tarragona and Real Racing Club Santander prior to joining Rubin earlier this year.
- One of Navas's final appearances for Racing came in a 2-1 home loss to Barcelona in February.

#### **UEFA milestones**

- The win in Barcelona was Rubin's first in the UEFA Champions League in their third game.

#### **UEFA Champions League statistics**

- Rubin have had six shots wide so far, the lowest total in the competition.
- Macbeth Sibaya is available again after a three-game ban following his dismissal against SK Rapid Wien in the 2007 UEFA Intertoto Cup third round second leg. Cristian Ansaldi's next yellow card will incur a one-match suspension.

- Kurban Berdyev made two changes to the team that beat FC Rostov 2-1 on 25 October, Aleksei Popov and fit-again Aleksandr Bukharov coming in for Alan Kasaev and Vitali Kaleshin.
- The Russian champions have won four in a row – against FC Khimki, Barcelona, Rostov and Krylya Sovetov – since ending a sequence of five games without a victory.
- Rubin have not kept a clean sheet since a 0-0 draw with FC Tom Tomsk on 20 September, a run of seven games.

- Alejandro Domínguez broke the deadlock at Rostov with his 12th goal in 15 games (including the Krylya Sovetov fixture), all but five coming from the penalty spot.
- Ansaldi's clincher against Rostov came a year to the day after his only previous goal for Rubin.
- The last unbeaten away record in the Premier-Liga ended when Rubin lost 2-1 at FC Lokomotiv Moskva on 4 October. The titleholders had won seven and drawn four of their previous eleven matches on the road and the setback cut Rubin's lead at the top to a solitary point. They had been seven clear on 12 September.

- Josep Guardiola made one change to the team that beat Real Zaragoza 6-1 on 25 October, Eric Abidal replacing Maxwell at left-back.
- Carles Puyol made his 453rd appearance for Barça against Osasuna, taking him past Carles Rexach and into third on the club's all-time appearance list. Xavi Hernández is second on 489, with Miqueli leading the way on 548.
- Seydou Keita has now scored four in three games having registered the first hat-trick of his career against Zaragoza.
- That 6-1 triumph was the perfect response to the 2-1 defeat by Rubin – Barcelona's first loss in 15 competitive fixtures since Osasuna's 1-0 win at Camp Nou on 23 May.
- Guardiola's side registered six goals five times in the Liga last term, including a 6-2 win at Real Madrid CF on 2 May.
- Goals in either half from Pedro Rodríguez earned holders Barça a 2-0 Copa del Rey round of 32 win at CD Leonesa on 28 October. The second leg at Camp Nou is on 10 November.
- Pedro has equalled Giovanni Silva's 1997/98 club record of scoring in five competitions in one season: the Liga, UEFA Champions League, UEFA Super Cup, Copa del Rey and Spanish Super Cup.
- The Blaugrana's club record-equalling six-match winning start to the Liga campaign was ended by a goalless draw against Valencia CF on 18 October. They also achieved the feat in 1929/30, 1990/91 and 1997/98.
- Zlatan Ibrahimović started the season by becoming the first new signing to score in Barcelona's opening five league games. Hristo Stoichkov held the previous record for a newcomer having struck in Barça's first three matches in 1990/91.

- On 31 October Puyol signed a three-year contract extension with Barça, tying him to Camp Nou until 2013.

- On 26 October Víctor Valdés collected the 2008/09 Zamora Trophy awarded to the goalkeeper with the best record in a Liga season. Valdés – who also won the award in 2004/05 – conceded 31 goals in 35 games last term. Barcelona vice-president Rafael Yuste collected the Miguel Muñoz Coach of the Year award on behalf of Guardiola.
- On the same day Guardiola, Daniel Alves, Andrés Iniesta, Lionel Messi and Sergio Busquets all received awards at the Professional Football League's (LFP) ceremony in Madrid in recognition of their achievements last season.
- Henry, Ibrahimović, Iniesta, Messi, Puyol and Xavi have been shortlisted for the FIFA World Player of the Year award. The winner will be announced in Zurich on 21 December.
- Abidal and Henry will hope to feature when France take on the Republic of Ireland in the 2010 FIFA World Cup play-offs on 14 and 18 November.
- Barça's youth academy residence at La Masia celebrated its 30th birthday on 20 October. Guardiola, Messi, Puyol, Xavi, Valdés, Gerard Piqué, Iniesta, Busquets, Bojan Krkić, Pepe Reina and Cesc Fàbregas are among its graduates.
- August signing Dmytro Chygrynskiy is ineligible for the UEFA Champions League having played twice for Shakhtar in qualifying. Keirison also joined from SE Palmeiras and has been loaned to SL Benfica.

## Head coach

---

### **FC Rubin Kazan: Kurban Berdyev**

**Date of birth:** 25 August 1952

**Nationality:** Russian

**Playing career:** FC Kolkhozchi Ashkhabad (twice), FC Kairat Almaty (twice), FC SKA Rostov-na-Donu, FC Rostov

**Coaching career:** FC Khimik Dzhambul/FC Taraz, Gençlerbirliği SK, FC Kairat Almaty, FC Caspiy, FC Nisa Ashkhabad, Turkmenistan, FC Kristall Smolensk, FC Rubin Kazan

- Berdyev played in seven Soviet Supreme League seasons as a defender and midfielder with Russian-based SKA Rostov-na-Donu and Kazakhstan's Kairat in the late 1970s and early 1980s.
- Started his coaching career in Kazakhstan with Khimik, who evolved into Taraz after independence, and was boss of Turkish side Gençlerbirliği in 1993/94.
- Coached the Turkmenistan national team from 1997 to 1999 in tandem with a position at capital side Nisa Ashkhabad.
- Hired to lead Rubin in 2001, his team won the second tier in 2002, finished third in 2003 and then won their first title in 2008; Muslim Berdyev marked that achievement by going on pilgrimage to Mecca.
- A very private man, Berdyev rarely gives interviews and generally works without an assistant.

### **FC Barcelona: Josep Guardiola**

**Date of birth:** 18 January 1971

**Nationality:** Spanish

**Playing career:** FC Barcelona, Brescia Calcio (twice), AS Roma, Al-Ahly Club, Dorados de Sinaloa

**Coaching career:** FC Barcelona B, FC Barcelona

- Known as 'Pep', he came up through Barcelona's youth ranks to win six Spanish Liga titles, one European Champion Clubs' Cup, a UEFA Cup Winners' Cup and two Copa del Rey trophies from 1990 to 2001.
- Also had spells with Brescia, Fabio Capello's Roma, Al-Ahly in Doha and Mexico's Dorados de Sinola before ending his playing career in 2006.
- Won 40 caps and Olympic footballing gold with Spain in 1992, but missed the 1998 and 2002 FIFA World Cup tournaments through injury.
- Having coached Barcelona's B team, became the 15th Catalan-born boss of the senior team in 2008 and won the UEFA Champions League, Spanish Liga and Copa del Rey in his first season in charge.
- Success in the 2008/09 final made Guardiola the sixth man to lift the European Cup as a player and a coach following Miguel Muñoz, Giovanni Trapattoni, Johan Cruyff, Carlo Ancelotti and Frank Rijkaard. Barcelona followed up with victories in the Spanish and UEFA Super Cups at the start of 2009/10.

- Austrian referee Konrad Plautz, a regular on the UEFA Champions League scene and the man in charge of the 2007 UEFA Super Cup as AC Milan beat Sevilla FC 3-1, is an enthusiastic director and actor with a local theatre group.
- A toolmaker from the Alpine town of Navis, Plautz began taking charge of matches as a teenager in 1984. He rose through the ranks at regional level before heading into the Austrian national leagues.
- Plautz reached Austrian Bundesliga standard after six years, getting his FIFA international badge in 1996. That same year he was selected to referee the UEFA European Under-16 Championship final in Vienna.
- A veteran of two FIFA World Cup qualifying campaigns and a referee for two matches at UEFA EURO 2008™, Plautz has experience of UEFA European Championship qualifiers back to March 1999.
- A regular presence in the latter stages of the UEFA Champions League, Plautz took charge of six matches in the competition in 2008/09 and also oversaw the UEFA Cup semi-final first leg between FC Dynamo Kyiv and eventual winners FC Shakhtar Donetsk.

## Competition facts

### • **UEFA Champions League:** Group stage milestones

Holders FC Barcelona are looking to avoid becoming the first defending champions to fail to get through a group stage since the UEFA Champions League began. (This record, like the others, includes the seasons between 1999/00 and 2002/03 that featured a second group stage).

In 1992/93, Barcelona were the reigning European Champion Clubs' Cup holders and were beaten 4-3 on aggregate in the second round by PFC CSKA Moskva.

S.S. Lazio goalkeeper Marco Ballotta became the oldest player to compete in the UEFA Champions League in 2007/08 when he featured against Olympiacos CFP on Matchday 1 at the age of 43 years and 168 days. The record was previously held by Alessandro Costacurta, the AC Milan defender who played against AEK Athens FC in the 2006/07 season at the age of 40 years and 211 days. Ballotta was aged 43 years 252 days when he featured against Real Madrid CF on Matchday 6.

Laurent Blanc is the oldest player to score in the competition, aged 36 years and 339 days, having found the net for Manchester United FC in their 3-2 defeat of Olympiacos CFP on 23 October 2002.

Celestine Babayaro is the youngest player to have appeared in the UEFA Champions League. He was 16 years and 87 days when he started for RSC Anderlecht against FC Steaua Bucureşti on 23 November 1994. He was then sent off in the 37th minute.

Barcelona, Manchester United and Milan have all finished as group winners on ten occasions, one more than Real Madrid and Juventus.

Four teams have recorded six successive victories in a UEFA Champions League group stage: Milan (1992/93), Paris Saint-Germain FC (1994/95), FC Spartak Moskva (1995/96) and Barcelona (2002/03, first group stage).

In 2006/07, PFC Levski Sofia joined 1. FC Košice in being the only team to have played in the UEFA Champions League and never picked up a point. The Slovakian side have not returned to the competition since losing all six games in their only campaign to date in 1997/98. Six other teams have gone through a single group stage campaign without picking up a point: FC Dynamo Kyiv (2007/08), SK Rapid Wien (2005/06) and RSC Anderlecht (2004/05) plus Spartak Moskva and Bayer 04 Leverkusen (2002/03, first and second group stage respectively) and Fenerbahçe SK (2001/02, first group stage).

Manchester United scored 20 goals in the 1998/99 group stage, more than any other side has managed. Barcelona scored 19 times in the 1999/2000 first group stage.

Dynamo conceded 19 goals in their six outings in 2007/08, equalling the record let in during a group stage set by Ferencvárosi TC in the 1995/96 campaign.

No team has ever gone through a UEFA Champions League group stage without conceding a goal. Milan (1992/93), AFC Ajax (1995/96), Juventus (1996/97 and 2004/05), Chelsea FC (2005/06), Liverpool FC (2005/06) and Villarreal CF (2005/06) all let in just one.

Before their 3-1 win against Sporting Clube de Portugal on Matchday 6 of the 2006/07 campaign, FC Spartak Moskva went 22 games without a victory in the competition, surpassing the unwanted record set by AEK Athens FC on Matchday 3 of the same campaign.

The lowest total for a team qualifying from the group stage is seven points. The first to do it, since three points for a win was introduced in 1995/96, were Legia Warszawa that same season before Bayer Leverkusen managed it in 1999/2000 and Liverpool in 2001/02. FC Lokomotiv Moskva and eventual finalists Juventus both progressed with seven points in 2002/03, a feat achieved by Rangers FC and Werder Bremen in 2005/06.
