Having dropped to third place in Group A as a result of their Matchday 3 defeat at FC Girondins de Bordeaux, FC Bayern München are hoping to get their UEFA Champions League campaign back on course when the French champions and section leaders visit Bavaria.

- The sides' first meeting could hardly have begun better for Bayern, who took a sixth-minute lead thanks to Michaël Ciani's own goal, yet the same player levelled in the 27th minute and Bayern then lost Thomas Müller to a second yellow card three minutes later. Marc Planus put Bordeaux in front in the 40th minute, and the hosts could even afford the luxury of Hans-Jörg Butt saving second-half penalties from Yoann Gourcuff and Jussië, Bayern finishing with nine men as Daniel Van Buyten was dismissed after conceding the second spot-kick.

**Previous meetings**

- Prior to Matchday 3 the teams' only previous encounter came in the 1995/96 UEFA Cup final. Bordeaux's campaign had started out in the UEFA Intertoto Cup but their epic journey had no happy ending as Bayern ran out convincing winners.

- The Bavarian side won the first leg in Germany 2-0 on 1 May 1996, Thomas Helmer and Mehmet Scholl getting the goals.

- They prevailed 3-1 in the return a fortnight later. Goals from Scholl and Emil Kostadinov killed off the contest and although Daniel Dutuel pulled one back, Jürgen Klinsmann sealed a 5-1 aggregate victory for the German side.

- The victorious Bayern coach was Franz Beckenbauer, now chairman of the club's supervisory board while at the Bordeaux helm was former Bayern player Gernot Rohr.

- Frenchman Jean-Pierre Papin appeared for Bayern in the first leg and subsequently signed for Bordeaux, spending the following two seasons at the Stade Chaban-Delmas. Bordeaux's team included Bixente Lizarazu, a future Bayern player and UEFA Champions League winner with the Bundesliga outfit in 2000/01.

#### **Match background**

- Bayern are unbeaten in eight home games in UEFA club competition, although five of those matches were drawn, including their Matchday 2 stalemate with Juventus.
- Bayern's most recent home meeting with Ligue 1 visitors was last season's 1-1 group-stage draw with Olympique Lyonnais, when Zé Roberto equalised a first-half own goal by Martín Demichelis.
- Bayern won their third European Champion Clubs' Cup title at the expense of French opposition when they defeated AS Saint-Etienne 1-0 in Glasgow in May 1976.
- Bordeaux earned a 0-0 draw at Werder Bremen on their most recent visit to Germany to seal a 4-1 aggregate success in the 2000/01 UEFA Cup third round. Ulrich Ramé is the only survivor of that Bordeaux outfit.
- Bordeaux suffered three defeats in four matches on their travels in Europe last term but picked up a 1-1 draw at Juventus in their opening away game in Group A.

#### **Team ties**

- Bordeaux coach Laurent Blanc played against Bayern in the UEFA Champions League for Manchester United FC, drawing home (0-0) and away (1-1) in the 2001/02 second group stage.
- In that same campaign, Blanc suffered the disappointment of a semi-final defeat in Germany as United lost on away goals to Bayer 04 Leverkusen.
- Blanc enjoyed UEFA Cup victories against Werder Bremen (1998/99 second round) and Hertha BSC Berlin (2000/01 third round) with Olympique de Marseille and FC Internazionale Milano respectively.
- Bayern coach Louis van Gaal faced AJ Auxerre in the 1996/97 UEFA Champions League group stage while at AFC Ajax. He had mixed fortunes, overseeing a 1-0 win in France and a 2-1 home defeat.
- Bordeaux midfielder Alou Diarra spent two seasons at Bayern from 2000 to 2002. He turned out alongside Philipp Lahm, Christian Lell, Michael Rensing and Bastian Schweinsteiger for the reserves but did not play for the first team before moving on to Liverpool FC.
- Diarra played alongside Franck Ribéry as France lost the 2006 FIFA World Cup final to an Italy side featuring Bayern striker Luca Toni.
- Ribéry was a team-mate of Bordeaux's Cédric Carasso for two seasons at Marseille from 2005 to 2007. Ribéry failed to score in five appearances against Bordeaux.
- Bordeaux's Gourcuff featured as a substitute in both legs of AC Milan's 2006/07 UEFA Champions League quarter-final victory against Bayern.
- In October 2007, Bordeaux's Jaroslav Plašil scored in a 3-0 win against Germany at the Fußball Arena München that secured the Czech Republic's qualification for UEFA EURO 2008™. Bayern's Schweinsteiger and Mario Gómez appeared for the hosts.
- Bordeaux defender Diego Placente spent four and a half years with Leverkusen before leaving in 2005. In nine league and cup games against Bayern he tasted victory once, losing six.
- Bayern's Van Buyten spent two and a half seasons in France with Olympique de Marseille from 2001. He scored in Marseille's 3-1 defeat at Bordeaux in February 2003.
- Bayern's Arjen Robben struck his first ever UEFA Champions League goal for PSV Eindhoven against French side Auxerre in a 3-0 home win on 30 October 2002. He also scored in the Netherlands' 4-1 defeat of France in the group stage at UEFA EURO 2008™.

- Louis van Gaal made one change to the side that beat Eintracht Frankfurt 4-0 in the German Cup third round on 28 October, Luca Toni making way for Mario Gómez to line up against his former club.
- It was Gómez's first start since 22 September having been used as a substitute in Bayern's last seven matches.
- Bayern were 2-1 victors over Frankfurt in the Bundesliga four days prior to their cup triumph – their 850th league win and their 550th at home. The 2-1 triumph at SC Freiburg on 17 October was their 300th away victory.
- Defender Van Buyten scored the winner against Frankfurt to take his season's tally for Bayern to five in all competitions.
- Mark van Bommel started the Freiburg game in what was his first appearance since breaking a toe in Bayern's Bundesliga opener against TSG 1899 Hoffenheim.
- The Bavarians are the only team in the Bundesliga yet to register a goal in the first 24 minutes.
- Thomas Müller has scored seven goals in his last twelve matches, five coming in the final 20 minutes.
- Bayern took just two points from the first three rounds of the Bundesliga, their worst start to a season for 43 years.
- Bayern will be at home to SpVgg Greuther Fürth in the German Cup quarter-finals on 9/10 February.

- Van Buyten was forced off through injury in the 82nd minute of the draw against Stuttgart.
- Ribéry is struggling to shake off a persistent knee problem, with Van Gaal explaining: "The injury keeps coming back. We have to get rid of it completely before he returns to the side."

- Bayern's Argentinian midfielder José Ernesto Sosa joined Club Estudiantes LP on loan until the end of the season on 29 October.
- Ribéry has been shortlisted for the FIFA World Player of the Year award. The winner will be announced in Zurich on 21 December.
- Anatoliy Tymoshchuk and Ukraine take on Greece in the FIFA World Cup play-offs on 14 and 18 November, when Ribéry's France face the Republic of Ireland.

- Marc Planus's winner was the Bordeaux native's second goal in three games following his clincher against Bayern on Matchday 3.
- It was the first time this season that first had played second in Ligue 1.
- Monaco have not beaten Bordeaux in their last eleven attempts since a 3-1 triumph on 21 May 2004.

- Les Girondins have won 13 successive home league games and are undefeated in 39 Ligue 1 fixtures at Stade Chaban-Delmas – a run stretching back to Olympique Lyonnais' 1-0 win on 7 October 2007.
- AS Saint-Etienne are the last side to have triumphed at Bordeaux in any competition, winning 1-0 on 3 January in the French Cup first round.
- Nine of Bordeaux's 20 league goals this season have come from set-pieces.
- Bordeaux's game against Montpellier Hérault SC, scheduled for 28 October, was one of a whole round of Ligue 1 fixtures postponed until December in order to give the French national team added preparation time for this month's FIFA World Cup play-off against the Republic of Ireland.
- The French champions have won all eight of their home games in all competitions this season, conceding just twice in the process.
- Marouane Chamakh's goal in the 3-0 win against Le Mans UC 72 on 24 October was his 50th league effort for the club.
- Bordeaux had lost two on the trot prior to their Matchday 3 meeting with Bayern, their first successive defeats since February 2007.
- The 3-1 loss at St-Etienne on 3 October was Les Girondins' first loss since a 3-0 reverse at Toulouse FC on 7 March – a 21-match unbeaten sequence that included 19 wins.
- Fernando Cavenaghi's missed penalty in the 1-0 defeat by AJ Auxerre on 17 October was the Argentinian's second failure to convert from the spot in three attempts.
- Bordeaux face Le Mans again in the French League Cup fourth round on 12 January.
- Alou Diarra is the only Bordeaux player to have started all eleven league games this season.
- Seven of Bordeaux's first 15 league goals of the campaign came from headers.

- Henrique – out since 10 October (knee)
- Henrique sustained a knee injury during a friendly with SCO Angers on 9 October and subsequently missed the Matchday 3 win against Bayern.

- Laurent Blanc will be a media pundit for the World Cup play-off between Ireland and France on 14 November in Dublin.
- A day prior to that game, Bordeaux play FC Nantes in a friendly.
- On 13 October, David Bellion signed a three-year contract extension, tying him to the club until June 2014.
- Yoann Gourcuff and Diarra will hope to be part of the France team that faces Ireland on 14 and 18 November.

- Having never made it beyond the reserve team at his first club, Ajax, Van Gaal spent most of his playing career as a Sparta midfielder, retiring in 1987 after a season with AZ, where he started his coaching career as an assistant.
- Took on a similar coaching role at hometown club Ajax, under Leo Beenhakker, from 1988 to 1991 before moving up to the top job on his mentor's departure.
- Had six glorious years at Ajax, winning three Eredivisie titles, a Dutch Cup, the 1992 UEFA Cup and the 1995 UEFA Champions League; defended that title in 1996 all the way to a penalty shoot-out defeat by Juventus in the final. Was awarded an Order of the Oranje-Nassau in 1997 and made a knight.
- Moved to Spain the same year for a three-season stint at Barcelona, winning two Liga titles and a Copa del Rey. Became Netherlands coach in 2000 in an unsuccessful bid to qualify the Oranje for the 2002 FIFA World Cup. Returned briefly to Barça before a spell out of coaching.
- Took over at Alkmaar in 2005, steering them to their first Eredivisie title since 1981 in April 2009. Appointed coach of Bayern a month later, as a replacement for caretaker Jupp Heynckes.

- Nicknamed 'Le Président' on account of his authority, elegance and leadership.
- Famous for 'good-luck' kiss on keeper Fabien Barthez's bald head before kick-offs, he won the 1998 FIFA World Cup on home soil after scoring France's Golden Goal winner against Paraguay in the last 16, but missed the Paris final after being sent off in the semis.
- Helped France win UEFA EURO 2000™, scoring against Denmark in the group stage, before retiring from international football that year with 97 caps and 16 goals.
- Spent four years taking coaching qualifications before being appointed Bordeaux coach in June 2007, making an immediate impact. His team finished second in his first season in charge and won a championship and League Cup double in 2009.

## Competition facts

### • **UEFA Champions League:** Group stage milestones

Holders FC Barcelona are looking to avoid becoming the first defending champions to fail to get through a group stage since the UEFA Champions League began. (This record, like the others, includes the seasons between 1999/00 and 2002/03 that featured a second group stage).

In 1992/93, Barcelona were the reigning European Champion Clubs' Cup holders and were beaten 4-3 on aggregate in the second round by PFC CSKA Moskva.

S.S. Lazio goalkeeper Marco Ballotta became the oldest player to compete in the UEFA Champions League in 2007/08 when he featured against Olympiacos CFP on Matchday 1 at the age of 43 years and 168 days. The record was previously held by Alessandro Costacurta, the AC Milan defender who played against AEK Athens FC in the 2006/07 season at the age of 40 years and 211 days. Ballotta was aged 43 years 252 days when he featured against Real Madrid CF on Matchday 6.

Laurent Blanc is the oldest player to score in the competition, aged 36 years and 339 days, having found the net for Manchester United FC in their 3-2 defeat of Olympiacos CFP on 23 October 2002.

Celestine Babayaro is the youngest player to have appeared in the UEFA Champions League. He was 16 years and 87 days when he started for RSC Anderlecht against FC Steaua Bucureşti on 23 November 1994. He was then sent off in the 37th minute.

Barcelona, Manchester United and Milan have all finished as group winners on ten occasions, one more than Real Madrid and Juventus.

Four teams have recorded six successive victories in a UEFA Champions League group stage: Milan (1992/93), Paris Saint-Germain FC (1994/95), FC Spartak Moskva (1995/96) and Barcelona (2002/03, first group stage).

In 2006/07, PFC Levski Sofia joined 1. FC Košice in being the only team to have played in the UEFA Champions League and never picked up a point. The Slovakian side have not returned to the competition since losing all six games in their only campaign to date in 1997/98. Six other teams have gone through a single group stage campaign without picking up a point: FC Dynamo Kyiv (2007/08), SK Rapid Wien (2005/06) and RSC Anderlecht (2004/05) plus Spartak Moskva and Bayer 04 Leverkusen (2002/03, first and second group stage respectively) and Fenerbahçe SK (2001/02, first group stage).

Manchester United scored 20 goals in the 1998/99 group stage, more than any other side has managed. Barcelona scored 19 times in the 1999/2000 first group stage.

Dynamo conceded 19 goals in their six outings in 2007/08, equalling the record let in during a group stage set by Ferencvárosi TC in the 1995/96 campaign.

No team has ever gone through a UEFA Champions League group stage without conceding a goal. Milan (1992/93), AFC Ajax (1995/96), Juventus (1996/97 and 2004/05), Chelsea FC (2005/06), Liverpool FC (2005/06) and Villarreal CF (2005/06) all let in just one.

Before their 3-1 win against Sporting Clube de Portugal on Matchday 6 of the 2006/07 campaign, FC Spartak Moskva went 22 games without a victory in the competition, surpassing the unwanted record set by AEK Athens FC on Matchday 3 of the same campaign.

The lowest total for a team qualifying from the group stage is seven points. The first to do it, since three points for a win was introduced in 1995/96, were Legia Warszawa that same season before Bayer Leverkusen managed it in 1999/2000 and Liverpool in 2001/02. FC Lokomotiv Moskva and eventual finalists Juventus both progressed with seven points in 2002/03, a feat achieved by Rangers FC and Werder Bremen in 2005/06.
