After their surprise home defeat by FC Zürich on 30 September, AC Milan will be determined to put themselves back in favour with their supporters with another good performance against Real Madrid CF.

- Their Matchday 2 reverse had left the Italian giants lagging in Group C, and their prospects looked even worse when Raúl González gave Madrid a 19th-minute lead at the Santiago Bernabéu. However, two goals in quick succession from Andrea Pirlo (62) and Pato (66) turned the match around. Substitute Royston Drenthe looked to have earned Madrid a point, yet Pato volleyed a winner with two minutes remaining to leave Milan and Madrid level on six points at the top of the table.

**Previous meetings**

- The teams' first competitive contest was a semi-final encounter in the European Champion Clubs' Cup debut season of 1955/56. Madrid edged that tie 5-4 on aggregate on their way to the first of five successive crowns.
- Milan have won all five home games against Madrid and have only conceded one goal. That came in their first meeting, the second leg of the semi-final 53 years ago which they won 2-1.
- Madrid's last visit to Milan was in November 2002, a 1-0 defeat in the second group stage. They have since made six visits to Italy, losing on four occasions. Their only victory in that period came in December 2004 when they won 3-0 at AS Roma.

**Match background**

- Milan's defeat by Zürich means they have lost two in a row in the UEFA Champions League at San Siro. Their previous home game resulted in a 2-0 loss to Arsenal FC in the 2007/08 first knockout round.
- This is the fourth time in three seasons that Los Merengues have been drawn against Italian opponents and they have lost the last five matches. They had won just one of the previous eight meetings.
- After their Matchday 1 victory at Zürich, Madrid are looking to make it successive away wins in the competition. Last season they won two away group games, at FC BATE Borisov and FC Zenit St. Petersburg, but lost at Juventus.

**Team ties**

- Several players are facing their former team. Kaká spent six seasons at Milan before his summer move to the Santiago Bernabéu while Clarence Seedorf won this trophy with Madrid in 1998. Klaas Jan Huntelaar had a seven-month spell with Madrid from December 2008.
- Xabi Alonso scored at the second attempt from the penalty spot for Liverpool FC against Milan to make it 3-3 in the 2005 final in Istanbul.
- During the penalty shoot-out in that same game, Jerzy Dudek saved from Pirlo and Andriy Shevchenko to help Liverpool earn the continental crown for the fifth time.
- While at Juventus, Filippo Inzaghi lost the 1998 final to Madrid in Amsterdam but scored both Milan goals in their 2-1 victory against Liverpool in the 2007 showpiece in Athens. Alonso and substitute Álvaro Arbeloa were in the opposing side that day with Dudek on the bench.
- Ronaldinho spent five years with Madrid's arch-rivals FC Barcelona, winning the UEFA Champions League in 2006.

- Gianluca Zambrotta spent two years at Barça between 2006 and 2008, while Christian Abbiati spent 2007/08 on loan with Club Atlético de Madrid.
- Leonardo was on the bench when Milan visited Madrid in the 2002/03 second group stage.
- Cristiano Ronaldo scored for Manchester United FC in their 2006/07 semi-final first leg 3-2 win against Milan, before the Italian side won the return 3-0. He and Ruud van Nistelrooy also played for United against Milan in the first knockout round in 2004/05, which the Rossoneri won 2-0 on aggregate.
- Mathieu Flamini played for Arsenal FC in both legs of the 2005/06 first knockout round tie with Madrid and celebrated a 1-0 aggregate triumph.
- At UEFA EURO 2008™ a Spain team containing Iker Casillas and Sergio Ramos defeated Italy, featuring Zambrotta and Massimo Ambrosini, on penalties in the quarter-finals. Pirlo and Gennaro Gattuso were both suspended for the game.
- Italy also fielded Christian Panucci in that defeat. Panucci was a UEFA Champions League winner with Milan in 1994 and Madrid four years later. Fernando Redondo also featured for both teams and like Clarence Seedorf and Panucci, was crowned European champion with each.
- Fabio Capello had separate spells as coach of Milan and Madrid. The Italian led the Serie A side between 1991 and 1996 as well as in the 1997/98 campaign. He was in charge at the Santiago Bernabéu in 1996/97 and again in 2006/07.
- David Beckham spent four seasons with Madrid between 2003 and 2007 and played on loan for Milan last year.
- Brazilian internationals Thiago Silva (Milan) and Marcelo (Madrid) both joined their teams from Fluminense.

#### UEFA milestones

- Pato's first goal on Matchday 3 was Milan's 550th in UEFA club competition.

#### UEFA Champions League statistics

- Milan have collected nine yellow cards to date, the joint highest total in the group stage along with Real Madrid CF and neighbours FC Internazionale Milano.
- The Italian side have also suffered 69 fouls, more than any other club.
- Clarence Seedorf has set up three goals to date, making him the competition's joint leading assist provider alongside Luis Fabiano.
- Filippo Inzaghi has been caught offside eleven times so far, more than any other player in the competition.
- Gianluca Zambrotta is one of four players to have committed ten fouls in the first three matches, the most in the group stage.
- Zambrotta's next yellow card will incur a one-match suspension.

- Leonardo made three changes – two enforced – to the back four which had conceded two late goals against SSC Napoli three days earlier. Massimo Oddo replaced the suspended Ignazio Abate, Kakha Kaladze the injured Alessandro Nesta and Luca Antonini was drafted in for Zambrotta, who was rested. Fit-again Gennaro Gattuso came in for Massimo Ambrosini in midfield, while Marco Borriello was preferred to Inzaghi up front.
- Borriello's goals, both set up by Ronaldinho, were his first of the campaign on what was his first start since recovering from injury.
- Milan squandered a two-goal lead at Napoli on 28 October. The hosts struck twice in the dying moments to earn a 2-2 draw and deny Milan, who had Abate sent off in the 86th minute, a third successive league victory.
- Four days after defeating Madrid, Milan won 2-1 at AC Chievo Verona thanks to two goals in the final nine minutes from Nesta. The centre-back had never previously scored more than once in a league campaign.

- Marco Storari had played every minute of Milan's 2009/10 campaign until Dida made his first start since 31 May against AS Roma on 18 October. Andrea Pirlo and Pato have featured in every game this term.
- The Rossoneri had struck just one goal in four games at San Siro this season before defeating Roma 2-1 – they scored in every home match in all competitions last term.
- Milan's 4-0 loss to FC Internazionale Milano on 29 August was their heaviest derby defeat since the Nerazzurri's 5-1 triumph on 24 March 1974. Only once, in 1910, have Inter won by a wider margin – 5-0.
- Despite being on Milan's books since 2003, Abate made his first league appearance for the Rossoneri in the goalless draw at AS Livorno Calcio on 12 September.

Raúl González dropped to the substitutes' bench in favour of an attacking lineup comprising Karim Benzema and Gonzalo Higuaín, the latter making his return from a thigh injury he suffered prior to Matchday 3.
- The victory was Madrid's first in four matches in all competitions.
- On 27 October, a Madrid side featuring Benzema, Raúl, Guti and Rafael van der Vaart were beaten 4-0 by third-tier AD Alcorcón in the first leg of the sides' Copa del Rey last-32 tie. The return takes place on 10 November at the Santiago Bernabéu.

- Against Alcorcón, Jerzy Dudek made his first Madrid appearance since keeping a clean sheet in the 3-0 defeat of FC Zenit St. Petersburg on Matchday 6 last season.
- The 0-0 draw with Sporting Gijón on 24 October was the first time the club had failed to score in any competition since a 3-0 defeat by Valencia CF on 9 May, a run of 13 matches.
- Madrid lost their 100 per cent record in all competitions when they were beaten 2-1 by Sevilla FC at the Ramón Sánchez-Pizjuán on 4 October.
- Raúl's double against Real Valladolid CF on 17 October took his Liga tally to 226, drawing him level with César Rodríguez in fourth on the all-time top scorers' list. He is now just one behind Alfredo di Stéfano, while Athletic Club Bilbao legend Telmo Zarra is first on 251.

- Had two-year stints in Spain and Japan before one year with PSG and a successful four-year spell with Milan, from 1997 to 2001. A San Siro crowd favourite, played a key role in Milan winning the Serie A title in 1999.
- Earned a FIFA World Cup winners' medal with Brazil as a defender in 1994 but missed the closing stages of the tournament after being sent off in the first knockout round.
- As a midfielder, helped Brazil finish runners-up to hosts France in the 1998 World Cup and retired with eight goals in 60 international games.
- Returned to Milan for the 2002/03 season, his last before retiring, and helped the Rossoneri win the Coppa Italia. Became Milan's technical director in 2008 and was made coach in May 2009 despite having no coaching background.

- The following campaign, Villarreal defied all expectations by reaching the UEFA Champions League semi-finals, where they bowed out 1-0 on aggregate to Arsenal FC.
- Turned Villarreal into a force to be reckoned with in the Liga, finishing second in 2007/08, a club record. They reached the UEFA Champions League quarter-finals last season, again being knocked out by Arsenal.
- Announced as the new Real Madrid coach on 1 June, signing a two-year contract.

## Competition facts

---

• **UEFA Champions League:** Group stage milestones

Holdes FC Barcelona are looking to avoid becoming the first defending champions to fail to get through a group stage since the UEFA Champions League began. (This record, like the others, includes the seasons between 1999/00 and 2002/03 that featured a second group stage).

In 1992/93, Barcelona were the reigning European Champion Clubs' Cup holders and were beaten 4-3 on aggregate in the second round by PFC CSKA Moskva.

S.S. Lazio goalkeeper Marco Ballotta became the oldest player to compete in the UEFA Champions League in 2007/08 when he featured against Olympiacos CFP on Matchday 1 at the age of 43 years and 168 days. The record was previously held by Alessandro Costacurta, the AC Milan defender who played against AEK Athens FC in the 2006/07 season at the age of 40 years and 211 days. Ballotta was aged 43 years 252 days when he featured against Real Madrid CF on Matchday 6.

Laurent Blanc is the oldest player to score in the competition, aged 36 years and 339 days, having found the net for Manchester United FC in their 3-2 defeat of Olympiacos CFP on 23 October 2002.

Celestine Babayaro is the youngest player to have appeared in the UEFA Champions League. He was 16 years and 87 days when he started for RSC Anderlecht against FC Steaua Bucureşti on 23 November 1994. He was then sent off in the 37th minute.

Barcelona, Manchester United and Milan have all finished as group winners on ten occasions, one more than Real Madrid and Juventus.

Four teams have recorded six successive victories in a UEFA Champions League group stage: Milan (1992/93), Paris Saint-Germain FC (1994/95), FC Spartak Moskva (1995/96) and Barcelona (2002/03, first group stage).

In 2006/07, PFC Levski Sofia joined 1. FC Košice in being the only team to have played in the UEFA Champions League and never picked up a point. The Slovakian side have not returned to the competition since losing all six games in their only campaign to date in 1997/98. Six other teams have gone through a single group stage campaign without picking up a point: FC Dynamo Kyiv (2007/08), SK Rapid Wien (2005/06) and RSC Anderlecht (2004/05) plus Spartak Moskva and Bayer 04 Leverkusen (2002/03, first and second group stage respectively) and Fenerbahçe SK (2001/02, first group stage).

Manchester United scored 20 goals in the 1998/99 group stage, more than any other side has managed. Barcelona scored 19 times in the 1999/2000 first group stage.

Dynamo conceded 19 goals in their six outings in 2007/08, equalling the record let in during a group stage set by Ferencvárosi TC in the 1995/96 campaign.

No team has ever gone through a UEFA Champions League group stage without conceding a goal. Milan (1992/93), AFC Ajax (1995/96), Juventus (1996/97 and 2004/05), Chelsea FC (2005/06), Liverpool FC (2005/06) and Villarreal CF (2005/06) all let in just one.

Before their 3-1 win against Sporting Clube de Portugal on Matchday 6 of the 2006/07 campaign, FC Spartak Moskva went 22 games without a victory in the competition, surpassing the unwanted record set by AEK Athens FC on Matchday 3 of the same campaign.

The lowest total for a team qualifying from the group stage is seven points. The first to do it, since three points for a win was introduced in 1995/96, were Legia Warszawa that same season before Bayer Leverkusen managed it in 1999/2000 and Liverpool in 2001/02. FC Lokomotiv Moskva and eventual finalists Juventus both progressed with seven points in 2002/03, a feat achieved by Rangers FC and Werder Bremen in 2005/06.
