Chelsea FC have made at least one visit to Spain in each of the last five UEFA Champions League seasons and their Matchday 4 fixture at the Vicente Calderón offers them the chance to continue an impressive run in the country at the expense of Club Atlético de Madrid.

- Matchday 3 suggested the London club should have little to fear in Madrid, Salomon Kalou scoring either side of half-time with Frank Lampard and a Luis Perea own goal completing a 4-0 win that prompted the departure of Abel Resino. The coach leaves Atlético with the club fourth in Group D having collected one point from three matches, while Chelsea have won every game to establish a three-point lead at the top of the standings.

Match background

- Before the Stamford Bridge fixture the teams had never met in a competitive fixture but the Premier League outfit are unbeaten in their last five games in Spain.
- Chelsea won two of those games, both 2-1 against Valencia CF and both in 2007, one a quarter-final and the other a group-stage contest. The sequence also includes three draws against FC Barcelona, most recently in last season's semi-final when a 0-0 away stalemate in the first leg left the English side optimistic only for Andrés Iniesta to strike in added time at Stamford Bridge as Barça advanced on away goals.
- Atlético have never lost in a competitive home game against English opponents. The last two fixtures ended in draws, against Liverpool FC in last season's group stage and Bolton Wanderers FC in the previous year's UEFA Cup round of 32, but before that the Madrid club had won four of the five matches.
- Chelsea's win at APOEL FC on Matchday 2 ended their recent indifferent away form in the UEFA Champions League. They failed to win on their travels in last season's group stage though in the knockout rounds they drew at Juventus and Barcelona either side of a 3-1 victory at Liverpool FC.
- Since a 2-1 defeat by Fenerbahçe SK in the 2007/08 quarter-final first leg, Chelsea have played eight away games in the UEFA Champions League, not including their defeat on penalties in the 2008 final in Moscow against Manchester United FC, and have drawn five, won two and lost one.
- The goalless draw against APOEL on Matchday 1 extended Atlético's unbeaten run at home in the UEFA Champions League. Last season, their first in the competition for 12 years, they won two and drew one of their group games and finished all-square with FC Porto in Madrid in the first knockout round, bowing out on away goals.

Team ties

- Diego Forlán scored for Uruguay against a Brazil team featuring Alex in the 2007 Copa América semi-finals. However, Forlán missed his penalty during the subsequent shoot-out, which Brazil won 5-4.
- Maxi Rodríguez played for Argentina in a 3-2 friendly defeat by England in Geneva in November 2005. John Terry and Frank Lampard lined up on the other side and Joe Cole appeared as a second-half substitute.
- Joe Cole scored England's winner in a friendly against Uruguay at Anfield in March 2006. Terry also featured while Forlán was in the visitors' lineup.
- Paulo Assunção played for Porto against Chelsea in both legs of the 2006/07 UEFA Champions League first knockout round.
- Pablo Ibáñez made his Spain debut against England in a friendly in Madrid in November 2004. Ashley Cole, Terry and Lampard all featured for the visitors and José Antonio Reyes for Spain.
- Reyes scored for Arsenal FC against Chelsea in the second leg of their UEFA Champions League quarter-final at Highbury in April 2004, but Lampard equalised and Chelsea eventually went through 3-2 on aggregate.

- Petr Čech and Tomáš Ujfaluši are team-mates for the Czech Republic.
- Simão plays for Portugal alongside Ricardo Carvalho, Deco and José Bosingwa.

• For his first Liga match in charge, Quique Sánchez Flores made two changes to the side that started the encounter with RCD Mallorca a week earlier. Sergio Asenjo returned in goal in place of David De Gea, while Álvaro Domínguez made way for Juanito in central defence.

• Quique Flores guided Atlético to a 2-0 victory at UD Marbella in the first leg of their Copa del Rey fourth round tie on 27 October, his first match after replacing Abel Resino. An own goal and a Maxi Rodríguez effort earned Los Rojiblancos only their second win in 12 games this season and put them in control ahead of the return in Madrid on 10 November.

• Resino departed on 23 October and assistant Santiago Denia oversaw the 1-1 home draw with Mallorca the following day as an added-time equaliser denied the hosts their second Liga win of the campaign.

• Los Colchoneros have earned seven points from their first nine games – three less than that accrued by the side of 1999/2000 who went on to be relegated.

• Atlético conceded 18 goals in their first eight Liga games, their worst defensive record at that stage since 1954/55, when they shipped 19 before recovering to finish in the top half of the table.

• Atlético have conceded two or more goals in eight of their 15 games this season.

• Atlético had claimed their first Liga win of the season on 3 October, beating Real Zaragoza 2-1 at home. It was their first victory in any competition in eight matches since an aggregate 5-2 triumph over Panathinaikos FC in the UEFA Champions League play-offs.

• The Vicente Calderón will host a friendly between Spain and Argentina on 14 November as part of the Spanish Football Federation's centenary celebrations.

- Simão will hope to help Portugal overcome Bosnia-Herzegovina in the FIFA World Cup play-offs on 14 and 18 November, when Forlán's Uruguay play Costa Rica.

- For the second time in four days, Chelsea put four goals past Bolton without reply, the home side losing Jilloyd Samuel to a red card for a foul on Drogba inside the area which enabled Frank Lampard to break the deadlock.
- Prior to their visit to Bolton, Carlo Ancelotti's side had lost two successive away games in the Premier League.
- Chelsea have won 14 of their 16 matches in Premier League, UEFA Champions League and League Cup action this season.
- Since losing 2-1 at Aston Villa FC on 17 October, Chelsea have struck 17 times and conceded zero goals en route to four successive wins. The 4-0 defeat of Atlético on Matchday 3 was followed by a 5-0 home win against Blackburn Rovers FC on 24 October, Frank Lampard scoring twice and Michael Essien getting his first league goal since March.
- They then beat Bolton 4-0 in the last 16 of the League Cup on 28 October, Daniel Sturridge making his full Chelsea debut, while Ross Turnbull also came on for his first appearance following a first-half injury to Henrique Hilário. Alex played for the first time since May.
- Chelsea had been on a club record eleven-game winning streak in the Premier League before losing at Wigan Athletic FC on 26 September.
- Chelsea have scored at least twice in 13 of their last 15 Premier League matches. The exceptions were the losses at Wigan and Villa, the former ending a 14-match unbeaten league run.
- Chelsea will visit Blackburn Rovers FC in the League Cup quarter-finals in the week beginning 30 November.

- Enjoyed some success as a player at Valencia, Madrid – where he won the Liga title in 1994/95 – and Zaragoza and made 15 international appearances for Spain before becoming a media pundit.
- Turned his hand to coaching in 2003, leading Madrid to the youth title before moving across the city to newly promoted senior side Getafe who enjoyed an impressive campaign, finishing 13th in 2004/05.
- Having spent ten years as a player at Valencia, Quique Flores was a popular choice to succeed Claudio Ranieri and duly took over at Mestalla in summer 2005. The signing of David Villa from Zaragoza proved inspired, the striker's 25 league goals helping Valencia finish third.
- The Spanish club went on to reach the UEFA Champions League quarter-finals in 2006/07 but a poor start to the following campaign cost Quique Flores his job in October 2007.
- Took charge of Benfica in May 2008 and led the Lisbon giants to third place in the Portuguese Liga in what proved his only season in charge. He left in June 2009 and was appointed Atlético coach four months later following the dismissal of Abel Resino.

- A combative midfielder, he helped Roma win the 1983 Serie A title and four Italian Cups before joining Milan in 1986 where he added two more league championships, as well as back-to-back European Cup triumphs in 1989 and 1990, to his tally.
- Began coaching in 1995 with a year at Reggiana, earning them promotion from Serie B, before spending two seasons at Parma. Replaced Marcello Lippi at Juventus in February 1999 and returned to San Siro as coach of Milan in 2001.
- Took Milan back to the top during an eight-year spell, winning the UEFA Champions League in 2003 and 2007, but losing the 2005 final on penalties to Liverpool FC after leading 3-0. Milan also won a Serie A title, a Coppa Italia and the 2007 FIFA World Club Cup.
- Resigned on 31 May and was named as Chelsea's new manager the following day.

Competition facts

• **UEFA Champions League:** Group stage milestones

Holders FC Barcelona are looking to avoid becoming the first defending champions to fail to get through a group stage since the UEFA Champions League began. (This record, like the others, includes the seasons between 1999/00 and 2002/03 that featured a second group stage).

In 1992/93, Barcelona were the reigning European Champion Clubs' Cup holders and were beaten 4-3 on aggregate in the second round by PFC CSKA Moskva.

S.S. Lazio goalkeeper Marco Ballotta became the oldest player to compete in the UEFA Champions League in 2007/08 when he featured against Olympiacos CFP on Matchday 1 at the age of 43 years and 168 days. The record was previously held by Alessandro Costacurta, the AC Milan defender who played against AEK Athens FC in the 2006/07 season at the age of 40 years and 211 days. Ballotta was aged 43 years 252 days when he featured against Real Madrid CF on Matchday 6.

Laurent Blanc is the oldest player to score in the competition, aged 36 years and 339 days, having found the net for Manchester United FC in their 3-2 defeat of Olympiacos CFP on 23 October 2002.

Celestine Babayaro is the youngest player to have appeared in the UEFA Champions League. He was 16 years and 87 days when he started for RSC Anderlecht against FC Steaua Bucureşti on 23 November 1994. He was then sent off in the 37th minute.

Barcelona, Manchester United and Milan have all finished as group winners on ten occasions, one more than Real Madrid and Juventus.

Four teams have recorded six successive victories in a UEFA Champions League group stage: Milan (1992/93), Paris Saint-Germain FC (1994/95), FC Spartak Moskva (1995/96) and Barcelona (2002/03, first group stage).

In 2006/07, PFC Levski Sofia joined 1. FC Košice in being the only team to have played in the UEFA Champions League and never picked up a point. The Slovakian side have not returned to the competition since losing all six games in their only campaign to date in 1997/98. Six other teams have gone through a single group stage campaign without picking up a point: FC Dynamo Kyiv (2007/08), SK Rapid Wien (2005/06) and RSC Anderlecht (2004/05) plus Spartak Moskva and Bayer 04 Leverkusen (2002/03, first and second group stage respectively) and Fenerbahçe SK (2001/02, first group stage).

Manchester United scored 20 goals in the 1998/99 group stage, more than any other side has managed. Barcelona scored 19 times in the 1999/2000 first group stage.

Dynamo conceded 19 goals in their six outings in 2007/08, equalling the record let in during a group stage set by Ferencvárosi TC in the 1995/96 campaign.

No team has ever gone through a UEFA Champions League group stage without conceding a goal. Milan (1992/93), AFC Ajax (1995/96), Juventus (1996/97 and 2004/05), Chelsea FC (2005/06), Liverpool FC (2005/06) and Villarreal CF (2005/06) all let in just one.

Before their 3-1 win against Sporting Clube de Portugal on Matchday 6 of the 2006/07 campaign, FC Spartak Moskva went 22 games without a victory in the competition, surpassing the unwanted record set by AEK Athens FC on Matchday 3 of the same campaign.

The lowest total for a team qualifying from the group stage is seven points. The first to do it, since three points for a win was introduced in 1995/96, were Legia Warszawa that same season before Bayer Leverkusen managed it in 1999/2000 and Liverpool in 2001/02. FC Lokomotiv Moskva and eventual finalists Juventus both progressed with seven points in 2002/03, a feat achieved by Rangers FC and Werder Bremen in 2005/06.
