Liverpool FC take on Debreceni VSC in Budapest facing an uphill struggle to escape early elimination from this season's UEFA Champions League.

- The Merseyside team lie third in Group E, five points behind second-placed ACF Fiorentina whom they face at Anfield on Matchday 6. To keep their hopes of progress alive until then, Rafael Benítez's team need two things: a victory against Debrecen and Fiorentina failing to beat Olympique Lyonnais at home.
- The Anfield club have not fallen at this hurdle in five previous campaigns under Benítez, though they were group-stage casualties in 2002/03.
- Liverpool have fought their way out of tight spots before during Benítez's reign, notably in 2007/08. Then, as now, they had four points after their first four games, albeit trailing second-placed Olympique de Marseille by three points rather than the five separating them from Fiorentina.
- Still point-less, Debrecen's hopes of qualification have already evaporated and they will definitely finish bottom of the group unless they beat Liverpool. The Hungarian titleholders are one of only two teams in the competition still to garner a single point – the other is Maccabi Haifa FC.

- The last team to suffer a 100 per cent losing record in the UEFA Champions League group stage was FC Dynamo Kyiv in 2007/08.

Previous meeting

- Liverpool won the teams' first ever encounter at Anfield on Matchday 1, Dirk Kuyt scoring the only goal in added time at the end of the first half.

Match background

- This is the second time Debrecen have welcomed English visitors. They previously lost 3-0 to Manchester United FC in a third qualifying round tie in August 2005, the concluding part of a 6-0 aggregate defeat. Tibor Dombi and Zoltán Kiss were in Debrecen's starting lineup that day.

- Liverpool's two previous visits to the Hungarian capital ended in stalemates. In the 1965/66 UEFA Cup Winners' Cup quarter-finals they held Budapest Honvéd FC 0-0 en route to a 2-0 aggregate success.

- A 0-0 draw with Ferencvárosi TC in the second round of the same competition in 1974/75 proved costly to Liverpool, eliminating them on away goals after a 1-1 first-leg draw at Anfield.

- That Liverpool exit was one of only three that English sides have suffered in 15 two-legged contests against Hungarian opposition.

Team ties

- László Bodnar faced Liverpool in the UEFA Champions League in 2001/02. Bodnar was on the bench for former club Dynamo Kyiv's 1-0 defeat at Anfield in September 2001 and then played the first 56 minutes when Liverpool won 2-1 in Ukraine the following month.

- Ádám Komlósi lined up against Liverpool pair Jamie Carragher and Steven Gerrard in Hungary's 3-1 friendly defeat by England at Old Trafford in May 2006. Komlósi lasted only nine minutes before succumbing to injury in a match where Gerrard scored the opening goal.

- Liverpool defender Daniel Agger visited the Ferenc Puskás Stadium in September 2008 with the Denmark national team, playing out a goalless draw in FIFA World Cup qualifying against a Hungary side that included Bodnár, Gergely Rudolf and Zoltán Szélesi.

- Liverpool midfielder Yossi Benayoun scored his first international goal at any level for Israel's Under-16 side against Hungary, securing a 1-0 home win for his team on 20 September 1995.

- Debrecen registered their second 1. Liga win in four days thanks to Gergely Rudolf's added-time winner.

- Debrecen have dropped eleven points in seven away games in the 1. Liga this term – they accrued 34 from a possible 45 on their travels last season.

- After 13 games the Hungarian champions have collected 25 points, five fewer than at the same stage last season.

- Debrecen ended a run of three consecutive defeats with a 1-0 win at home to Kecskeméti FC on 17 November.

- Defeats by FC Videoton, Újpest FC and Győri ETO FC prior to that success represented the first time Debrecen had lost three successive league matches since July and August 2001.

- Debrecen will play MTK Budapest in the Hungarian Cup quarter-finals next month.

- Péter Szilágy scored the only goal as Debrecen beat Honvéd in the Hungarian Super Cup on 18 July.

- Péter Bíró, Péter Máté, Dávid Mohl and Dudu were all left out of Debrecen's UEFA Champions League squad due to hamstring injuries. Bíró is expected to return to training this week while Dudu has been a regular scorer for the club's second team.
- On 16 November Rudolf was one of the first to buy tickets to the 2010 UEFA European Futsal Championship which takes place between 19 and 30 January at Debrecen's Főnix Arena and the Papp László Sportaréna, Budapest. "I like technical football and futsal is a sport where you really need those skills," he said. "I don't want to miss the EURO, especially as most of the games will be in Debrecen. It's a really exciting time for the city."

- Liverpool's winless run stretched to five games in all competitions as Rafael Benítez's side recorded a third successive draw, against Manchester City.
- Škrtel's goal was his first for Liverpool in his 65th appearance for the club.
- After seven victories in their opening nine games in all competitions, Liverpool have since won just one of their subsequent ten fixtures, losing six.
- It was the 18th successive Premier League home match in which Liverpool have found the net, equalling a club record set between December 2001 and November 2002. The Reds last failed to score in a league game at Anfield in a goalless draw against West Ham United FC on 1 December 2008.
- The Merseyside club had lost five successive away matches in all competitions prior to the draw at Olympique Lyonnais on Matchday 4.
- Fernando Torres has scored seven goals in his last five Premier League appearances.
- Liverpool have amassed 20 points 13 games into the Premier League season, 12 fewer than at the same stage last term. They lost only two league games in 2008/09 but have been beaten five times already this season.
- The Matchday 3 defeat by Lyon was Liverpool's fourth successive loss in all competitions, their worst run since March/April 1987.

- Gerrard and Torres have been shortlisted for the FIFA World Player of the Year award. The winner will be announced in Zurich on 21 December.

• On 16 November a film recreating the half-time events of the 2005 UEFA Champions League final made its world premiere at a cinema in Liverpool. Gerrard, Jamie Carragher and former Red Dietmar Hamann all play themselves in the comedy 15 Minutes That Shook The World.

• Another member of that Liverpool side, Vladimír Šmicer, announced his retirement at the age of 36 on 10 November, saying: "My heart wants to play on, but the body will not have it." Šmicer said he had accepted an offer from Football Association of the Czech Republic president Ivan Hašek to work alongside coach Michal Bílek with the national team.

- On 12 November Daniel Ayala signed a contract extension tying him to Anfield until 2012.

Coaching career: Debreceni VSC, Hungary Olympic team (as assistant), Tiszaújváros, Létavértes, Debrecen (as assistant), Debrecen

- András Herczeg has spent the majority of his career with Debreceni VSC, culminating in his steering the Hungarian club to the UEFA Champions League group stage for the first time at the start of 2009/10.
- Born in Gyongyos, Herczeg's long association with Debrecen stretches back to 1970, stepping up to the first team four years later and helping the club to the second division title in 1978/79.
- Herczeg hung up his boots in 1988 and spent the next decade working for Debrecen in various coaching capacities before leaving for a year as assistant coach to Hungary's Olympic team.
- Leaving that post in 1999, Herczeg returned to Debrecen and had stints with the club's youth team either side of spells in charge of Tiszaújváros and Létavértes.
- After two league titles as assistant to Attila Supka in 2005 and 2006, Herczeg's big break came when Miroslav Beránek left the club in 2007. He was an instant success, leading Debrecen to their third Hungarian Cup in 2008 and adding a fourth league title in five seasons a year later, although the crowning glory was to come at the start of the 2009/10 campaign.

Liverpool FC: Rafael Benítez

- A midfielder for Real Madrid CF's reserve team and two other lower ranking sides, injury prompted an early move into coaching.
- Coached at youth and B-team level with Madrid, he struck out on his own with Valladolid, Osasuna, Tenerife and Extremadura before getting his big break in 2001 at Valencia.
- Guided Valencia to the club's first league title for 31 years in 2002 and repeated the feat in 2004, when they also won the UEFA Cup.
- Joined Liverpool in June 2004, winning the UEFA Champions League in his first season, with his side beating AC Milan on penalties after trailing 3-0 in the final. Also won the 2006 FA Cup on penalties, after trailing West Ham United FC 3-2 in stoppage time of the Cardiff showpiece.
- Took Liverpool to the top of the Premier League for two spells during 2008/09 but Manchester United FC retained their title. Ended media speculation about his Anfield future in March 2009 by signing a new contract until 2014.

• Bjorn Kuipers is following in the family trade as he continues to work his way up the refereeing ladder, with his father having also acted as an official in the Netherlands.

• Kuipers Jr earned his FIFA badge aged 33, in 2006 – the year he took charge of the UEFA European Under-17 Championship final between the Czech Republic and Russia. He stepped up to work as a fourth official in both the UEFA Champions League and UEFA Cup during the season that followed.

• A fourth official for four matches at the 2007 UEFA European Under-21 Championship, Kuipers – who lives in the Dutch town of Oldenzaal with his wife and daughter, works as a supermarket director and counts mountain biking among his hobbies – held the same role in five qualifying games for UEFA EURO 2008™.

• He was appointed as referee for 2008/09 UEFA Cup fixtures, including the meeting Round of 32 meeting of holders FC Zenit St. Petersburg and VfB Stuttgart.

• Kuipers was back at the U21 tournament as a referee in 2009, taking charge of four matches in Sweden including Germany's 4-0 final defeat of England.

• **UEFA Champions League:** Group stage milestones

Holder FC Barcelona are looking to avoid becoming the first defending champions to fail to get through a group stage since the UEFA Champions League began. (This record, like the others, includes the seasons between 1999/00 and 2002/03 that featured a second group stage).

In 1992/93, Barcelona were the reigning European Champion Clubs' Cup holders and were beaten 4-3 on aggregate in the second round by PFC CSKA Moskva.

S.S. Lazio goalkeeper Marco Ballotta became the oldest player to compete in the UEFA Champions League in 2007/08 when he featured against Olympiacos CFP on Matchday 1 at the age of 43 years and 168 days. The record was previously held by Alessandro Costacurta, the AC Milan defender who played against AEK Athens FC in the 2006/07 season at the age of 40 years and 211 days. Ballotta was aged 43 years 252 days when he featured against Real Madrid CF on Matchday 6.

Laurent Blanc is the oldest player to score in the competition, aged 36 years and 339 days, having found the net for Manchester United FC in their 3-2 defeat of Olympiacos CFP on 23 October 2002.

Celestine Babayaro is the youngest player to have appeared in the UEFA Champions League. He was 16 years and 87 days when he started for RSC Anderlecht against FC Steaua București on 23 November 1994. He was then sent off in the 37th minute.

Barcelona, Manchester United and Milan have all finished as group winners on ten occasions, one more than Real Madrid and Juventus.

Four teams have recorded six successive victories in a UEFA Champions League group stage: Milan (1992/93), Paris Saint-Germain FC (1994/95), FC Spartak Moskva (1995/96) and Barcelona (2002/03, first group stage).

In 2006/07, PFC Levski Sofia joined 1. FC Košice in being the only team to have played in the UEFA Champions League and never picked up a point. The Slovakian side have not returned to the competition since losing all six games in their only campaign to date in 1997/98. Six other teams have gone through a single group stage campaign without picking up a point: FC Dynamo Kyiv (2007/08), SK Rapid Wien (2005/06) and RSC Anderlecht (2004/05) plus Spartak Moskva and Bayer 04 Leverkusen (2002/03, first and second group stage respectively) and Fenerbahçe SK (2001/02, first group stage).

Manchester United scored 20 goals in the 1998/99 group stage, more than any other side has managed. Barcelona scored 19 times in the 1999/2000 first group stage.

Dynamo conceded 19 goals in their six outings in 2007/08, equalling the record let in during a group stage set by Ferencvárosi TC in the 1995/96 campaign.

No team has ever gone through a UEFA Champions League group stage without conceding a goal. Milan (1992/93), AFC Ajax (1995/96), Juventus (1996/97 and 2004/05), Chelsea FC (2005/06), Liverpool FC (2005/06) and Villarreal CF (2005/06) all let in just one.

Before their 3-1 win against Sporting Clube de Portugal on Matchday 6 of the 2006/07 campaign, FC Spartak Moskva went 22 games without a victory in the competition, surpassing the unwanted record set by AEK Athens FC on Matchday 3 of the same campaign.

The lowest total for a team qualifying from the group stage is seven points. The first to do it, since three points for a win was introduced in 1995/96, were Legia Warszawa that same season before Bayer Leverkusen managed it in 1999/2000 and Liverpool in 2001/02. FC Lokomotiv Moskva and eventual finalists Juventus both progressed with seven points in 2002/03, a feat achieved by Rangers FC and Werder Bremen in 2005/06.
