AZ Alkmaar are four points behind Olympiacos FC with just two games remaining but a first UEFA Champions League victory of the season will put Ronald Koeman's side right back in contention for the qualifying places in Group H.

- On Matchday 4 the home side went down 4-1 at Arsenal FC to remain at the foot of the table with two points. Jeremain Lens scored for AZ but only after the London team had scored four goals.
- The same night Olympiacos succumbed 2-0 in Belgium against R. Standard de Liège, conceding in each half. It meant the Greek champions stayed on six points, two ahead of Standard and in the second qualifying berth.

Previous meetings

- The Matchday 1 fixture between the sides came just a day after Olympiacos had parted company with Temuri Ketsbaia and with new coach Zico looking on from the stands. It remained deadlocked until the 79th minute when Vassilis Torosidis headed in Jaouad Zairi's cross to give the home team the win.

Match background

- That 16 September meeting was the first time AZ had failed to beat Greek opponents in an official fixture. Their previous three games had included two at home, beating PAOK FC 2-1 in the 2004/05 UEFA Cup first round and Larissa FC 1-0 in the group stage of the same competition three years later.
- Olympiacos have failed to register a victory in their four previous away games against teams from the Netherlands and are yet to score a goal. They avoided defeat only in their first visit, a 0-0 draw against AFC Ajax in the 1983/84 European Champion Clubs' Cup first round.
- Their 1-1 draw with Arsenal on 20 October means AZ have lost just once in 35 home games in UEFA club competition, starting a long sequence of unbeaten matches on their home debut in Europe in September 1977. The run carried on through 32 games and 30 years until 20 December 2007 when Everton won 3-2 in the UEFA Cup group stage at the AZ Stadion, which had replaced the Alkmaarderhout in 2006.

Team ties

- Olympiacos defender Olof Mellberg and AZ's Pontus Wernbloom are team-mates in the Swedish national side.
- Mounir El Hamdaoui of AZ and Olympiacos' Jaouad Zairi are international team-mates with Morocco.
- AZ's first league title, in 1981, came with Georg Kessler as head coach. He took charge of Olympiacos in 1984/85.
- When Brazil beat the Netherlands on penalties in the 1998 FIFA World Cup semi-final in Marseille, AZ coach Ronald Koeman was assistant to Guus Hiddink for the Oranje, while Zico was Mário Zagallo's right-hand man for Brazil.
- Zico was the Fenerbahçe SK coach when they lost on away goals to AZ in the 2006/07 UEFA Cup round of 32 after the aggregate scores were tied at 5-5.
- The following season Zico's Fenerbahçe played out a 0-0 away draw against Koeman's PSV Eindhoven in the UEFA Champions League group stage.
- As an Ajax player Koeman was knocked out by Olympiacos in the aforementioned 1983/84 European Champion Clubs' Cup first round tie.
- Koeman's assistant, Shota Arveladze, played for Ajax against Olympiacos in the 1998/99 UEFA Champions League group stage.
- Giorgos Galitsios played for Larissa against AZ in the 2007/08 UEFA Cup group stage.
- Maarten Martens and Michał Żewłakow were team-mates at RSC Anderlecht in the 2003/04.

- Not in AZ's UEFA Champions League squad, it was an Eredivisie debut to remember for Jonathas. Within four minutes of his late introduction the Brazilian, 20, had scored his first goal, within seven he had picked up his first yellow card and there was still time to be shown a straight red.
- Forward Jonathas had been drafted in from AZ's youth team due to the absence of Mounir El Hamdaoui, Graziano Pellè (both injured), Moussa Dembélé (ill) and the suspended Ari.
- It was only AZ's third win in 14 league and UEFA Champions League matches; they have lost seven in that sequence.
- On 8 November AZ were held 1-1 at home by Ronald Koeman's former club, Feyenoord. The draw was AZ's first in the Eredivisie in 15 matches, since sharing the spoils at AFC Ajax on 26 April.
- On 28 October AZ booked a Dutch Cup last-16 meeting with Feyenoord on 22 December, although they needed extra time to see off amateur club SV Spakenburg 5-2.
- On 25 July AZ claimed the Super Cup for the first time with a 5-1 win against SC Heerenveen – the fixture's biggest margin of victory since 1991. El Hamdaoui, Brett Holman, Maarten Martens and Jeremain Lens (2) were on target.

- Olympiacos let slip a two-goal lead at Giannina and with it their eight-match winning run away from home in the league, a record dating back to 8 March and a 0-0 draw at PAOK FC.
- Zico made three changes to the team that drew 1-1 with Iraklis FC on 7 November. Returning from injury, Jaouad Zairi and Oscar González replaced Ioannis Fetfatzidis and Giorgos Niklitsiotis, while Ieroklis Stoltidis came in for Avraam Papadopoulos.
- Antonis Nikopolidis and Olof Mellberg have not missed a minute of Olympiacos's league campaign, while Kostas Mitroglou has featured in every match.

- Olympiacos's seven-match winning run in the league had been ended with the draw at home to Iraklis, Enzo Maresca's first-half opener cancelled out in added time.
- Having made his first-team debut as a substitute at Atromitos FC on 31 October, Fetfatzidis played 90 minutes against Iraklis.
- The Greek champions have kept eleven clean sheets in 20 competitive fixtures this term.
- A youthful Olympiacos side played second-tier Ionikos FC in a friendly on 17 November, goals from youth-team players Dimitrios Diamantakos and Charalampos Lykogiannis earning the Greek titleholders a 2-1 win.
- Holders Olympiacos were knocked out of the Greek Cup at the first hurdle on 27 October when they lost their last-32 tie 3-1 at second-tier Panserraikos FC – only the second time in their history the Piraeus outfit have suffered elimination at the hands of lower-league opposition.
- Olympiacos have scored in every Super League fixture since Zico took charge. They last drew a blank in a 0-0 draw with FC Kavala on 12 September, Temuri Ketsbaia's last match at the helm.
- Olympiacos meet Athens rivals and league leaders Panathinaikos FC in the league on 29 November.

Torosidis was ruled out of the play-off through injury while Giorgos Galitsios received his maiden call-up for the second leg but was not included in the matchday squad.

Head coach

AZ Alkmaar: Ronald Koeman

Date of birth: 21 March 1963

Nationality: Dutch

Playing career: FC Groningen, AFC Ajax, PSV Eindhoven, FC Barcelona, Feyenoord

Coaching career: Netherlands (assistant coach), FC Barcelona (assistant coach), BV Vitesse, AFC Ajax, SL Benfica, PSV Eindhoven, Valencia CF, AZ Alkmaar

- Sweeper and dead-ball expert Koeman started his career with his brother Erwin at Groningen, with both featuring in the Netherlands' 1988 UEFA European Championship-winning side.
- As a player he won a Dutch title and cup with Ajax; two Dutch championships, two cups and the 1987/88 European Champion Clubs' Cup with PSV; four Spanish titles, one Copa del Rey and the 1991/92 European Cup – scoring the winner in the final – with Barça.
- After spells as assistant coach with the Netherlands and Barça, Koeman impressed in sole command at Vitesse and won a Dutch double at Ajax in his first season, 2001/02, and a second title two years later.
- Won another Dutch title with PSV in 2006/07 while the 2007/08 Spanish Cup was the highlight of his spell at Valencia.
- Replaced FC Bayern München-bound Louis van Gaal as coach of Dutch champions AZ in summer of 2009.

Olympiacos FC: Zico

Date of birth: 3 March 1953

Nationality: Brazilian

Playing career: CR Flamengo (twice), Udinese Calcio, Kashima Antlers

Coaching career: Kashima Antlers, Japan, Fenerbahçe SK, FC Bunyodkor, PFC CSKA Moskva, Olympiacos FC

- An improbably gifted attacking midfielder, Arthur Antunes Coimbra shone for Brazil and won four domestic titles, as well as the 1981 Copa Libertadores and European/South American Cup, with Flamengo.
- Spent two seasons in Europe at Udinese from 1983 to 1985, and was later Brazil's minister of sport prior to hanging up his boots – and subsequently starting his coaching career – in Japan, where Zico's form for Kashima Antlers earned him the nickname 'God of Football'.
- Having taken Japan to the 2006 FIFA World Cup finals, joined Fenerbahçe, winning the title in his first season and leading his side to the 2007/08 UEFA Champions League quarter-finals – their best season in the competition.
- He left Turkey with a new nickname, 'Kral Arthur' (King Arthur), and spent 2008 in Uzbekistan, winning a domestic double with big-spending Bunyodkor, featuring former Brazil star Rivaldo.
- Replaced Valeri Gazzaev as CSKA coach in January 2009, winning the Russian Super Cup and Russian Cup over the next few months. Sacked in September 2009, less than a week later he succeeded Temuri Ketsbaia at Olympiacos on a two-year contract.

• Alberto Undiano Mallenco has made tremendous progress in his native Spain in recent years and is quickly establishing himself in high-level European action.

• Born in Pamplona, Undiano Mallenco stepped up to the Spanish top flight in September 2000 and had already reached the 100-game milestone, aged just 32, at the start of the 2006/07 season when he took charge of the Basque derby between Athletic Club Bilbao and Real Sociedad de Fútbol.

• He was awarded his FIFA badge in 2004 and made his UEFA bow the same year. Undiano Mallenco experienced his first finals at the 2004/05 UEFA European Under-19 Championship in Northern Ireland, by which time he was already featuring in UEFA Champions League qualifying. His first taste of the FIFA World Cup came with a September 2005 qualifier between Estonia and Latvia.

• Undiano Mallenco was part of the refereeing team at the 2006 European U21 Championship, and had the honour of being in the middle for the semi-final on 1 June in which the Netherlands, the eventual champions, defeated France 3-2.

• He also refereed the 2005/06 Spanish Super Cup second leg between FC Barcelona and Real Betis Balompié and in July 2007, he officiated the FIFA U-20 World Cup final. Has remained a regular in the UEFA Champions League and UEFA Cup, overseeing four matches in the former competition in 2008/09.

• **UEFA Champions League:** Group stage milestones

Holdes FC Barcelona are looking to avoid becoming the first defending champions to fail to get through a group stage since the UEFA Champions League began. (This record, like the others, includes the seasons between 1999/00 and 2002/03 that featured a second group stage).

In 1992/93, Barcelona were the reigning European Champion Clubs' Cup holders and were beaten 4-3 on aggregate in the second round by PFC CSKA Moskva.

S.S. Lazio goalkeeper Marco Ballotta became the oldest player to compete in the UEFA Champions League in 2007/08 when he featured against Olympiacos CFP on Matchday 1 at the age of 43 years and 168 days. The record was previously held by Alessandro Costacurta, the AC Milan defender who played against AEK Athens FC in the 2006/07 season at the age of 40 years and 211 days. Ballotta was aged 43 years 252 days when he featured against Real Madrid CF on Matchday 6.

Laurent Blanc is the oldest player to score in the competition, aged 36 years and 339 days, having found the net for Manchester United FC in their 3-2 defeat of Olympiacos CFP on 23 October 2002.

Celestine Babayaro is the youngest player to have appeared in the UEFA Champions League. He was 16 years and 87 days when he started for RSC Anderlecht against FC Steaua Bucureşti on 23 November 1994. He was then sent off in the 37th minute.

Barcelona, Manchester United and Milan have all finished as group winners on ten occasions, one more than Real Madrid and Juventus.

Four teams have recorded six successive victories in a UEFA Champions League group stage: Milan (1992/93), Paris Saint-Germain FC (1994/95), FC Spartak Moskva (1995/96) and Barcelona (2002/03, first group stage).

In 2006/07, PFC Levski Sofia joined 1. FC Košice in being the only team to have played in the UEFA Champions League and never picked up a point. The Slovakian side have not returned to the competition since losing all six games in their only campaign to date in 1997/98. Six other teams have gone through a single group stage campaign without picking up a point: FC Dynamo Kyiv (2007/08), SK Rapid Wien (2005/06) and RSC Anderlecht (2004/05) plus Spartak Moskva and Bayer 04 Leverkusen (2002/03, first and second group stage respectively) and Fenerbahçe SK (2001/02, first group stage).

Manchester United scored 20 goals in the 1998/99 group stage, more than any other side has managed. Barcelona scored 19 times in the 1999/2000 first group stage.

Dynamo conceded 19 goals in their six outings in 2007/08, equalling the record let in during a group stage set by Ferencvárosi TC in the 1995/96 campaign.

No team has ever gone through a UEFA Champions League group stage without conceding a goal. Milan (1992/93), AFC Ajax (1995/96), Juventus (1996/97 and 2004/05), Chelsea FC (2005/06), Liverpool FC (2005/06) and Villarreal CF (2005/06) all let in just one.

Before their 3-1 win against Sporting Clube de Portugal on Matchday 6 of the 2006/07 campaign, FC Spartak Moskva went 22 games without a victory in the competition, surpassing the unwanted record set by AEK Athens FC on Matchday 3 of the same campaign.

The lowest total for a team qualifying from the group stage is seven points. The first to do it, since three points for a win was introduced in 1995/96, were Legia Warszawa that same season before Bayer Leverkusen managed it in 1999/2000 and Liverpool in 2001/02. FC Lokomotiv Moskva and eventual finalists Juventus both progressed with seven points in 2002/03, a feat achieved by Rangers FC and Werder Bremen in 2005/06.
